



2014 Annual Report

Dear Friends,

How quickly time flies. It is hard to believe that in 2014 La Plaza celebrated our ten year anniversary of service to Central Indiana's Latino community. Over the last ten years, La Plaza has empowered Latino youth to achieve their full academic potential, while helping Latino families achieve greater self-sufficiency. In 2014 we proudly served more than 5,000 Latinos through our signature programs and engaged 15,000 Latinos through our events that strengthen the cultural fabric of Indianapolis. This annual report highlights our 2014 accomplishments, in particular.

It was an exciting year. You may have noticed our new brand, a fresh look that remains reflective of our mission and vision, and a new website, which is much more functional, informative, and engaging for students, parents, and the community. Programmatically, La Plaza formally integrated our Mother-Daughter/ Father-Son Programs with Tu Futuro and implemented a six-year college readiness and access pipeline for Latino students in grades 7-12. La Plaza also piloted Adelante Familias, an empowerment-based workforce development program focusing on career planning and attainment, asset building, and leadership development. Aligned with the highly regarded Center for Working Families (CWF) model, this pilot will be scaled up to reach more families later this year and into 2016.

Yet there is much work left to do. From 2000–2013, the Latino population in metro Indianapolis grew from about 33,000 to 123,000 individuals, an incredible 273% increase. Now comprising 10% of the people living in the Indianapolis metro area, the Latino community is robust and diverse with representation among elected officials, business, and community leaders. And yet the need for La Plaza has never been greater. Fewer than 60% of Latinos have a high school education, and many lack transportation and health insurance, experience food insecurity, and are at risk of homelessness (The Polis Center, 2013). Only 18% of Latino adults age 18 to 54 in Indiana have college degrees, making Latinos the group with the lowest postsecondary educational attainment level in the state (2010 Census).

With these trends in mind, our Board of Directors, staff members, and stakeholders will soon embark on a 2017–2020 strategic planning process to define our 2020 vision and build our capacity to empower Central Indiana's growing Latino community. As we begin our next decade of service, our optimism for what is possible has never been greater.

Thank you for being a part of our success. We look forward to our continued work together.

La Plaza helps Latinos reach their full potential by building on their strengths and fostering self-sufficiency through greater access to educational opportunities and health and human services.



TU FUTURO

A high school completion and college access initiative for Central Indiana Latino students.

- 1,434 7th-12th grade Latino students served.
- 95% understand the course work necessary to graduate from high school.
- 90% know the college admission process and steps to apply to college.
- 95% feel prepared to go to college.
- 322 seniors from the class of 2014 served at 18 high schools, of which:
 - 97% graduated from high school, and
 - 66.7% are currently enrolled in a college.

THE LEADERSHIP INSTITUTE FOR LATINO YOUTH (LILY)

A five-week academic and leadership summer program where middle and high school students gain the necessary skills to succeed in high school, college, career, and in life.

- 64 7th-12th grade Latino students served.
- 84% improved English skills.
- 87% improved math skills.
- 81% increased knowledge about college readiness and career preparation.
- 95% identified a career path and academic plan.

SUMMER DISCOVERY

A five-week academic and enrichment summer program for elementary school students focused on reading, math, technology, leadership, and physical activity.

- 123 elementary Latino students served.
- 93% improved language arts skills.
- 89% improved math skills.
- 98% participated in the Public Library's Summer Reading Program.
- 92% read 20 or more books.
- 94% participated in community service projects.

ACCESS TO HEALTH AND SOCIAL SERVICES

A holistic approach to family success involving access to health insurance, prenatal and pediatric care, dental and medical services, food and nutrition resources, emergency rent and utility assistance, and more.

- 2,832 individuals served through the Access Program.
- 1,426 Latino families served with our Emergency Assistance programs to relieve their rent, utility, holiday and food needs.
- 6,277 referrals provided for co-located and community services.
- 214 individuals learned about job opportunities.

LA PLAZA SCHOLARSHIP FUND

Renewable four-year college scholarships to qualifying Latino students.


